

Future Plans Data Element VSA College Portrait

The data for the future plans of bachelor's degree recipients comes from one of two sources.

1. A common survey question administered to graduating seniors as a stand-alone item, incorporated into the application for degree process, added to an existing senior exit or employment survey, or through another appropriate method. (See below for the exact text of the question.)
2. The College Senior Survey (CSS) question that mirrors the language of the question below. The CSS is a national survey administered by Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) at the Higher Education Research Institute at UCLA - <http://www.heri.ucla.edu/cirpoverview.php>. As the question numbering in the CSS changes annually, institutions wishing to use this option should review the questions and/or contact CIRP or the VSA for assistance in identifying the correct question. (*added as an option in January 2010*)

Administration Guidelines

- **Student Surveyed:** Either all students who plan to graduate within an academic year or all students who plan to graduate in the spring term of the academic year – ideally no more than 3 months prior to their anticipated graduation. For example, institutions that plan to survey all graduates during the academic year should survey May graduates during the spring semester and survey December graduates during the fall semester.
- **Frequency:** Updated annually. Results are reported on the College Portrait for the most recently completed academic year.
- Institutions are required to report their sample size, administration method, and response rate through a link from the College Portrait.
